School-Wide Norms for Parents and Families

- Be courteous when communicating and always assume positive intention.
- Recognize the value of instructional time and activities during the school day.
- Demonstrate respect for the learning environment and school property.
- Promote the dignity and self worth of others.
- Demonstrate respect for the rights, property and feelings of others.
- Avoid confrontations, profanity, and aggressive behavior.

Mission: To accelerate the opportunities and outcomes for our children by demanding nothing but excellence from the students, staff, and the community.

Mission and Vision

Vision: To accelerate the academic achievement of all students, in partnership with the entire community, to ensure that students have the attitudes, skills, and proficiencies needed to succeed in college and the 21st century global workforce.

School-wide Goals

Academics

- At least 30% of students achieve proficiency or above as measured by end of the year school and state literacy assessments (Amplify, ANET, MCAP).
- By June 2023, increase reading proficiency for students in the special education population from 0% to 5% as measured by the end of the year assessment and schoolwide assessments.
- At least 15% of students achieve proficiency or above as measured by end of the year school and state math assessments (Amplify, ANET, MCAP, NWEA)
- By June 2023, increase math proficiency for students in the special education population from 0% to 5% as measured by the end of the year assessment and schoolwide assessments.

Communication and Engagement

- Increase the yearly attendance average rate from 86% to 90%.
- Decrease the chronically absent rate from 62% to 45%.
- Each family should participate in at least 20 points of contact throughout the year, totaling 7,720 or more points of contact for the school community.

Student Wholeness

- Ensure a safe and secure learning environment by decreasing office referrals from 253 to 240.
- Ensure a safe and secure learning environment by decreasing school suspensions from 24 to 21.

Furman L. Templeton's Beliefs

- <u>All children can learn at high levels</u>, regardless of their race, socioeconomic background, language, or family situation.
- For children from a diverse spectrum to learn at high levels, they need to be taught and supported by people in schools and homes <u>who believe they can learn, who approach</u> <u>teaching with the idea that students will learn if taught well, and who take seriously an</u> <u>ongoing effort to improve their practice</u> in line with the best thinking and examples in the field.
- For teaching of this kind to be realized <u>across the whole school</u>, leadership at the school
 needs to be squarely focused on supporting the improvement of teaching in an ongoing and
 routine way.




This year, every staff member has committed to the being a rainbow in the lives of the students and families we serve.

Furman L. Templeton Preparatory Academy School History

- Furman L. Templeton Elementary opened in 1971 as The School of Love.
- School named after Mr. Furman L. Templeton who was a campaigner for African American civil rights in Baltimore and was the Executive Director of the Urban League.
- FLT became a conversion public charter school in 2011
- Renewal in 2015 and 2017 granted the school an additional three years as a charter
- Renewal in 2021 granted the school an additional three years as a charter, July 2022 - June 2025
- FLT will start the renewal process in 2024 to continue as a charter for at least three years
- In 2025, The Board of School Commissioners will vote on renewal recommendations

- FLTPA is a PBIS School
- Individual students are supported via the Student Support Team, Intervention, GAL, Wholeness, and SPED
- Students wear uniforms Mon-Thurs and dress down on Fridays
- The school day starts at 7:30 am and students are late after 7:46 am; lawful absences may be excused by a parent note
- Students are dismissed at 2:25 pm to designated locations; early dismissals will not be granted after 2:00 pm; all students must be signed out
- Parents may visit the classroom but should not plan for teacher conferences during instruction
- Recess will be held during lunch for all students
- All instructional teachers are responsible for maintaining grades
- Homework is expected to be given as a grade-level for a minimum of 4 days a week

- Parents will need to be scanned into the building (ID required); identification information will be stored
- Parents must enter the building through the front door only
- Main office related affairs will be addressed at 8:30 am to allow a safe and organized student entry
- Parents may visit classrooms based on scheduled appointments with the teacher; in the event a visit is not scheduled, the classroom teacher will be contacted by the main office first
- Students in grades K 5 students will enter through the cafeteria blacktop at 7:30 am and report directly to breakfast
- Pre-K students will enter through the playground doors and go directly to their classrooms. Students will transition to the cafeteria for breakfast by the paraeducator

- Students on the 1st floor will be dismissed from their classrooms after being signed out with a teacher managed roster
- Students on the 2nd floor will be dismissed from the auditorium after being signed out with a teacher managed roster
- Students on the 3rd floor will be dismissed from the gym after being signed out with a teacher managed roster
- Families will have the option of entering or waiting for the student to exit via walkie communication

- Students who receive car transportation will be picked up and wait in the carline. Families will be grouped together to assist in a smoother transition
- Parents should complete the car transportation survey if they plan pick up through the car line or communicate to the main office that students will be picked up by car
- Auditorium doors do not open during dismissal; all parents must report to designated dismissal areas for student pick-up.
- Any parent arriving after 2:35 should report to the main office for student pick-up
- Cones will be set-up in the morning and afternoon by school officers

Other School Announcements

- No pajama-type attire, undershirts or other bedtime attire is allowed, unless approved by the principal for a specific event, such as "pajama day."
- No half shirts revealing waist lines, sports bras
- Slippers, thongs, "heelys," flip-flops, slides and other shoes without backs (crocs not in sport mode) are not allowed.
- No hats, hair rollers, curlers or bonnets are allowed. Hats or head coverings are permitted for religious or approved medical accommodations.
- Pants should be worn appropriately at the waist, without undergarments showing(no rips that expose flesh).
- Face coverings are not permitted unless for religious or approved medical purposes. For example, ski masks are not allowed, but surgical masks are allowed to prevent spread of illness.
- Shorts and skirts may not be shorter than fingertip length (the bottom hem of the shorts/skirt should not fall above the student's fingertips when their arms are relaxed at their sides). Halter tops, tank tops, spaghetti straps, muscle shirts, or see-through clothing are not allowed.
- No elastic fabric sportswear is allowed, but clothing with elastic waistbands is permitted.
- No clothing designed or altered to expose undergarments or parts of the body except arms or legs are allowed.
- No undergarments worn as outerwear are allowed. Clothing should be worn so that undergarments, including boxer shorts, thongs, or bras, are not exposed.
